The teacher education program at Jackson State University is designed to provide a basic core of general studies courses, appropriate knowledge base in teaching core courses and professional studies, and modern methodologies in professional practice. Teacher candidates have many opportunities to participate in field experiences. Student teaching is considered to be the culminating experience where candidates are provided the opportunity to integrate theory and practice to demonstrate skills as a responsive educator.

Field experiences at JSU are challenging, exciting, and rewarding and are viewed as the apex of the career building experience that influences the kind of teacher professional that our candidates will ultimately become. As the culminating phase of the teacher preparation program, the student teaching experience is a twelve week experience in school districts across the state where candidates practice and sharpen their skills under direct supervision of cooperating teachers and college supervisors. Through this partnership with districts, students graduate from Jackson State University ready to enter the teaching profession with the knowledge, skills, and disposition to positively and effectively impact teaching and learning.

Faculty Accomplishments

Dr. Jianjun Yin, along with two other JSU educators, was awarded a grant in the amount of \$500,000.00 from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to help attract African American students into science and engineering fields through service learning. The proposal entitled, "Investigation of Effects of Scaffolding Creative Problem Solving through Question Prompts in Project-Based Service Learning" is designed to investigate the effects of scaffolding Creative Problem Solving (CPS) through Project-Based Service Learning (PBSL) on the development of students' higher-order skills and their identity as engineers and innovators, especially for African-American students.

Dr. Yin was also one of the three faculty members from the EECE Department who were awarded a service learning grant from the University's Center for Committee Engagement. Most recently **Dr. Jianjun Yin** co-authored two research articles and they have been accepted for publication by peer referred professional journals.

FALL FOLLOW -UP SESSION

On October 23, 2010, the fall follow-up session for the Alliance for Teacher Quality was held in the Jackson Education Building. During the session, participants shared back to school experiences that involved leading district and building level professional development sessions; providing innovational ideas to colleagues, changing grade levels and schedules; becoming identified as lead teachers, interventionist, and mentors for new teachers. A reflective survey was completed and data will be used to plan the activities for upcoming sessions. The next follow-up sessions are scheduled for February 19, and March 12, 2010.
