- F. Course description: A survey of drama and theater history examining historical practices used in the modern theater. Attendance at theater performances and reading representative plays are required.
- G. Objectives: DR-201 is an appreciation course, designed to acquaint students with theatre as an art form; however, the class also includes practical exercises and a studio component. By participating in the course students will be able to
 - 1. Understand the fundamentals of creating, comprehending and critiquing theatre;
 - 2. Develop spontaneous and imaginative performance skills, while learning to build a sense of ensemble;
 - 3. Work through acting exercises designed to establish relationships, strengthen sensory recall and the ability to communicate memories;
 - 4. Learn to respond to the given circumstances including objects, characters, situations, as well as the environment;
 - 5. Improve listening skills and the ability to react spontaneously in a theatrical situation;
 - 6. Utilize status and character relationships as they appear in a theatrical context; and,
 - 7. Increase creativity and self-confidence and while also honing decision-making skills.

C. Graded components

- 1. Students will present one **paper**, worth 10% of the final grade.
 - a. The paper will be typed and at least 500 words.
 - b. The paper will respond to the performances, direction and design of the JSU Theatre production of *The Color Purple*, which runs Oct 31 through Nov 5.
 - c. The paper will be due at the beginning of the class period on November 6.
 - d. Late papers will be assessed a ten point penalty per class period.
- 2. Students will present two **projects**, worth 40% of the final grade.
 - a. The first project must be an acting project.
 - b. The second project will be selected from the following areas: acting, directing, scenic design, costume design, light and sound design, playwriting, or producing.
 - c.Late projects will be assessed a ten point penalty per class period.
- 3. Students will take three **tests**, worth 30% of the final grade.
 - a. Tests will focus on lectures, reading material, studio exercises and projects.
 - b. Students will be assigned a grade of zero if they are absent on a test day.
 - c. Each student may make-up one and only one test at the end of the semester.
- 4. Students will be graded on **participation**, worth 20% of the final grade.
 - a. Theatre is a collaborative art form, and your classmates need you to succeed.
 - c. Students must be respectful and supportive of the work of their classmates.
 - d. Examples of activities which might result in a lower participation grade include, but are not limited to:
 - i. Using a cell phone or other texting device during class;
 - iii. Entering or leaving the classroom during a student scene or presentation;
 - iv. Talking to others during a student scene or presentation;
 - v. Failing to have necessary materials for class;

- vi. Being dressed inappropriately for activities;
- vii. Failing to participate in activities;
- viii. Sleeping in class

V. Academic Dishonesty Policy

All acts of academic dishonesty (such as cheating on exams, plagiarizing another person's work as one's own, having another person write a paper, fabricating research data, presenting excuses which are untrue for failing to meet academic and professional standards) are a violation of University policy, and will result in appropriate penalties.

VI. Attendance / Tardy Policy

- F. Students who miss more than five classes will have their final grade lowered by two letters.
- G. Students who miss more than seven classes will be assigned a grade of "F" and dropped from the class.

- E. Students should speak with the instructor if they are uncomfortable with the dramatic content of the course.
