D. Course description: This course acquaints the student with artistic elements and practical techniques of scenic design. Laboratory work consists of several scene designs in different styles. Each design includes ground plans, perspective drawings and frontal elevations.

E. Course objectives:

- 1.Develop an understanding of scenic design practices.
- 2.Learn to analyze a script from a scenic design perspective.
- 3. Develop research skills in scenic design.
- 4. Develop a basic proficiency in theatrical drafting for scenic design.
- 5.Develop skills in making 2-D and 3-D representations of scenic design decisions
- 6.Develop an appreciation for varied design solutions for theatrical productions.

All students will be expected to submit drafted groundplans of design projects. Either CAD (computer aided drafting) or traditional drafting is acceptable. In either case students should procure the necessary equipment to complete the drafting of their designs. A minimal collection of drafting equipment would include: T-square, two triangles, an architect's scale, drafting pencils, eraser, circle templates and/or compass, French curves, erasing shield, and lettering guide, vellum and 1/4" gridded notepad paper.

Sample materials that will be utilized during the semester might include: illustration and matte board, watercolors and/or gauche, assorted artists' brushes, colored pencils, assorted glues, hobby knives, balsa/bass wood, foam board, gesso and modeling paste. Other materials including many found objects may be added as desired by the individual student. DON'T BUY ANY EQUIPMENT UNTIL WE TALK IN CLASS – unless you already know exactly what you will need.
