

MISSISSIPPI CHILD WELFARE INSTITUTE AND CONFERENCE HISTORY

The Mississippi Child Welfare Institute was established at Jackson State University in 2003 as a part of the School of Social Work. The impetus to begin the Institute emanated from a grant awarded by the Children's Bureau, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services during the 2000 to 2004 period. The proposal was developed by Gwendolyn Spencer Prater, PhD, MSW, who was then Dean of the School of Social Work. The Institute and conference began prior to the organization of the academic colleges at Jackson State University.

The proposal submitted to the Children's Bureau resulted in a funded grant which permitted 26 committee-selected and dedicated students to participate in the education project. All of the social work students were provided tuition, stipends, and special training and educational opportunities both in-state and across the country at national conferences with the goal of preparing them for careers in child welfare. The students graduated and many attained social work positions in the field of child welfare. Mrs. Wanda Gilliam, MSW, Deputy Director of Programs, Mississippi Department of Human Services, was the liaison with the School of Social Work during the grant period and actively and successfully facilitated productive experiential educational opportunities for students with the Division of Family and Children's Services.

During the 2002-2003 academic year, Jackson State University's School of Social Work, in partnership with other state institutions of higher learning, and the Mississippi State Department of Human Services, under the capable leadership of Mrs. Thelma Brittain, MSW, initiated the Title IV-E Program in Child Welfare. The program was readily supported by the Mississippi Legislature, with strong leadership from the late Representative Charlie Capp, Chair of the House Appropriations Committee. Jackson State University's administration also provided strong support for the Institute and the conference. The School of Social Work programmatic and administrative leadership team included Drs. Prater and Ruth M. Williams as the Principal Investigator and Co-Principal Investigator, respectively, and Ms. Velma Hankins, MSW, as the Program Administrator.

The program continued for approximately three and one-half years, with Jackson State University serving as the lead institution for the majority of that period, with the final program year being rotated to one of the other state institutions of higher education. Numerous students at the baccalaureate and master's levels were educated and provided training for child welfare practice with vulnerable populations. In addition, during that three-year period, training was also developed and provided for foster and adoptive parents and public child welfare staff. Since that time, there has not been a consortium of state schools and programs of social work jointly engaged in Title IV-E academic programming with the Mississippi Department of Human Services.

The Mississippi Child Welfare Institute at Jackson State University, however, continues to offer its annual conference for professional development of child welfare practitioners, supervisors, administrators, faculty, and students in Mississippi, other states in the Southeastern Region, and indeed across the United States of America. The Institute partners with public and private agencies and organizations as it works to improve services to children and families including but not limited to: the Mississippi State Departments of Human Services, Health, and Mental Health, the Children's Defense Fund (Southern Regional Office), Mississippi Children's Home Services and CARES Center, Catholic Charities, and the Casey Family Programs and Marguerite Casey Foundations.

OPENING PLENARY SPEAKER



Johnnetta McSwain-Clay, MSW, is a doctoral candidate in the social work program in the Whitney M. Young, Jr. School of Social Work at Clark-Atlanta University in Atlanta, Georgia. Ms. McSwain-Clay is an EMMY Award Winning documentarian, author of Rising Above the Scars, a life development coach, and empowerment speaker. Johnnetta also founded Dreamwright Publications and Breaking the Cycle: Beating the Odds, an organization that helps women to become self-aware of their negative, selfdestructive behavioral cycles.

Born to an alcoholic mother and an absent father, the odds were stacked against Ms. McSwain-Clay. By the age of five, she was viciously raped and incessantly battered by her three uncles. At age 12, Johnnetta began shoplifting which led to the beginning of criminal system troubles and bouts with drugs. After reflecting on her life, Johnnetta relocated to Georgia with a GED and a dream to be the first in her family to earn a terminal degree. Three years after beginning college at Kennesaw State University, she received her bachelor's degree. Two years later she earned her master's in social work at Clark Atlanta University.

Alberta Ellett, PhD, is an associate professor at the University of Georgia, School of Social Work. Dr. Ellett is nationally known as a leader in several professional organizations through her contributions in promoting the continued professionalization of child welfare. Dr. Ellett has served as the principal investigator of several research/evaluation and instructional grants and contracts. Her research interests and specializations center on developing child welfare organizations and strengthening their holding power in ways that retain and promote the development of competent child welfare staff. Dr. Ellett's scholarly child welfare publications include refereed journal articles, book chapters, book reviews, and several reports. She has presented numerous evaluation and research papers at national child welfare and social work conferences and professional meetings. Dr. Ellett was Co-Editor of the Journal of Public Child Welfare (2004-2010) and was selected Editor-in-Chief in 2011, a position she currently holds.

Dr. Ellett earned her PhD in Social Work with a minor in Industrial and Organizational Psychology from Louisiana State University. She has over 25 years of direct practice and administrative experience in child welfare in Georgia and Louisiana.

PLENARY SPEAKERS



William Buster is the Director of Mississippi and New Orleans Programming at the W.K. Kellogg Foundation in Battle Creek, Michigan. He has over 12 years experience in philanthropy supporting and developing community advocacy, cross-community and cross-organization collaboration, and economic development efforts. He also has extensive experience in supporting organizational development for nonprofits. Prior to joining the foundation, Mr. Buster was a program officer at the Mary Reynolds Babcock Foundation of Winston-Salem, North Carolina. Mr. Buster has received several awards and recognitions for his work, including selection as a Hull Fellow by

the Southeastern Council on Foundations of Atlanta, Georgia. He has the distinction of being a founding member of the Black Family Land Trust whose purpose is to help African-American families in the southeastern United States find creative ways to save family land in rural and urban settings.

Mr. Buster holds a baccalaureate degree in history from North Carolina Agricultural & Technical University, Greensboro. He is completing a master's degree in Development Policy and Practice from the University of New Hampshire. He also has completed the JFK School of Government's Executive Leadership Training Program at Harvard University.



Dominic Carter is the author of *No Momma's Boy*, an autobiography that depicts his triumph over insurmountable odds and rising to the top, and a political commentator at RNN-TV News in Rye Brook, New York. For over seven years, he served as a senior political anchor at New York 1 (NY1) News in New York, New York. During his tenure at NY1, he launched the highly acclaimed political show, "Inside City Hall" in 1992. Mr. Carter has interviewed the likes of former President Bill Clinton, Nelson Mandela, Donald Trump, and a number of other esteemed political individuals. As a victim of childhood sexual abuse, his life story has been told in

Oprah Winfrey's magazine and on the Nancy Grace Show. His awards include the Samuel P. Peabody Award for his vision, innovation and dedication to children and families.

Mr. Carter earned his undergraduate degree in journalism at the State University of New York at Cortland in Cortland, New York and attended graduate school at Syracuse University, Syracuse, New York.

Lisa McGill, PhD, is the Site Liaison to Mississippi for the Jim Casey Youth Opportunities Initiative. She also serves as the Director of the Youth Transition Funders Group, a national network of funders dedicated to ensuring the successful transitions of young people between the ages of 14 and 24 to adulthood. She has contributed to several publications in the philanthropic sector and also author of *Constructing Black Selves: Caribbean American* Narratives and the Second Generation (New York University Press, 2005). Over the years, Dr. McGill has worked with several foundations and funders' networks to help them advance relationships and sustain impact in under-resourced communities. She has worked on projects for community foundations, as well as national foundations such as the W.K. Kellogg Foundation, Charles Stewart Mott Foundation, and Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Dr. McGill has also provided consulting services to philanthropic affinity groups such as Grantmakers for Education, the Association of Black Foundation Executives, and CFLeads.

Before consulting, Dr. McGill worked as a program officer in a community foundation and as a coordinator of community outreach and events programming. She received her doctorate in American Studies at Yale University. Her undergraduate degree, in English modified with Latin American and Caribbean Studies, is from Dartmouth College.


