



OPENING PLENARY SESSION SPEAKER



Beverly Black, PhD, MSSW, is a Professor at the School of Social Work, University of Texas at Arlington. Dr. Black joined the faculty in 2008 to serve as the Director of the MSSW Program. She previously served as the interim associate dean at Wayne State University where she had been a faculty member since 1995. She was also on the social work faculty at Texas Christian University and Florida International University.

Dr. Black conducts research and publishes on issues related to domestic violence, sexual assault, adolescent dating violence, and prevention programming. For several years, she received funding from the State of Michigan to coordinate and evaluate dating

violence and sexual assault prevention programs for middle school students in Detroit. She also received funding from the National Institute of Justice to develop programming to prevent dating violence and sexual assault on the campus of Wayne State University. Dr. Black frequently serves as a reviewer for the Centers for Disease Control on violence prevention grant proposals. She has numerous publications on issues related to violence including a book with Dr. Arlene Weisz titled *Programs to Reduce Teen Dating Violence & Sexual Assault: Perspectives on What Work*.

PLENARY SPEAKER



Dr. Stacy L. Spencer serves as the Senior Pastor of New Direction Christian Church in Memphis, Tennessee. He is also the Chairman of the Board of Directors for the Power Center CDC, an organization designed to launch a charter school and business/career center, develop youth programming, and teach entrepreneurial basics. During his junior year in college, Dr. Spencer acknowledged his call to ministry and accepted a full-time position as the Youth Minister at St. Stephen Baptist Church in Louisville, Kentucky. He was ordained in 1992 and earned his Master of Divinity degree from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1993. He created programs, including Rites of Passage, Teen Summit, and an active

Sunday School for St. Stephen Baptist Church. Dr. Spencer is the author of a recently published book on healthy Christian marriage.

Dr. Spencer received his Doctorate of Ministry from Drew University in Madison, New Jersey. He is married to Rhonda Spencer and they are the proud parents of 4 sons: Calvin, Omari, Jordan and Jaden Lynn.



She continued her research activities at the University working with HIV positive population, at risk youth, women in

Taylor R. McGlawn, MSW, is the President/CEO of MGS, LTD a real estate development, transportation and events coordination firm. He served almost 40 years in social work practice and was the Director of Field Education for 20 years. Mr. McGlawn also taught a variety of courses in policy and planning, gerontology and macro practice. Mr. McGlawn most recently worked with The Every Child Matters Education Fund, Washington, D.C. to establish its first Field Office in Mississippi. He also spearheaded two major statewide initiatives: Step Up for Kids, a children's issue rally at the Mississippi State Capitol and the Mississippi Kids and Youth Convention. Mr. McGlawn has served as President of the Association of Gerontology in Human Development in Historically


