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

The Margaret Walker Center proudly hosts the 50th Anniversary Reconvening of the Phillis Wheatley Poetry Festival. The festival celebrates the legacy of Phillis Wheatley, Margaret Walker, and the artistic and intellectual excellence of Black women writers through three days of intergenerational conversations, scholarly analysis, and creative writing.

In 1973, Margaret Walker hosted a groundbreaking conference for Black women writers for the bicentennial of Phillis Wheatley's work, *Poems on Various Subjects, Religious and Moral*. Hosted by her Black Studies Institute founded five years earlier at Jackson State, thirty of these leading women participated in a series of events on campus.

Fifty years later, attendees from the original festival, including the likes of Alice Walker and Sonia Sanchez, have returned for a reconvening of the Phillis Wheatley Poetry Festival and intergenerational conversations with writers like Nikole Hannah-Jones, Jesmyn Ward, and Imani Perry.

In all, 21 women of color will participate in keynote events for the festival's 50th anniversary from November 1 to 4, 2023, and over 700 people from around the world will attend.

MARGARET WALKER WITH ELIZABETH CATLETT'S BUST OF PHILLIS WHEATLEY, 1973

In 1773, PHILLIS WHEATLEY published Poems on Various Subjects, Religious and Moral, the first authored book of poetry by an African American woman. Before enslavers kidnapped and sold a young Wheatley in Boston, she spent her early life in West Africa.

An avid learner, she began composing poetry as an enslaved girl, later publishing and reciting her work before a global audience. Wheatley became a renowned poet who inspired many Black women writers, including Margaret Walker.

MARGARET WALKER was raised in New
Orleans and graduated from Northwestern
University in Illinois. Originally her MA thesis
at the University of Iowa, her collection of
poetry, For My People, received the 1942 Yale
University Younger Poets Award, and, in 1966,
her dissertation became the classic novel Jubilee.
On the English faculty at Jackson State for thirty
years (1949-1979), she founded her Black Studies
Institute in 1968. As Director, she organized
several conferences, including the 1973
Phillis Wheatley Poetry Festival.



A Jackson State graduate, Tommie "Tonea" Stewart is a professional actress, play director, tenured Professor. and retired Dean of the College of Visual & Performing Arts at Alabama State University. She was the first African American female to receive a doctorate from the Florida State School of Theatre.



# **VINIE BURROWS**

Vinie Burrows is an award-winning Broadway actress, who has created her own plays and one-woman shows performed in over 6,000 theaters across four continents. She won the 1986 Paul Robeson Award and has been recognized by the International Communications Association for her Outstanding Contribution to the Arts and the Community.



# **CAROLE GREGORY**

Carole Gregory has taught at New York University, Tufts, and CUNY. Her poems have been published in more than ten anthologies, and she has written eleven plays as a member of the Frank Silvera Writer's Workshop. Her newest play is Phillis Wheatley Speaks Through the Ages.

# **SONIA SANCHEZ**

Sonia Sanchez is the author of over twenty volumes of poetry as well as plays and children's books. She has lectured widely across the United States and abroad. In 1977, she began teaching at Temple University and held the Laura Carnell Chair in English there until her retirement in 1999.



# **IMANI PERRY**

Imani Perry is the Hughes-Rogers Professor of African American Studies at Princeton University. Her writing has appeared in The New York Times, The Atlantic, and Harper's. Her latest book. South to America, won the National Book Award. She is a 2023 MacArthur "Genius Grant" recipient.



# **JOANNE V. GABBIN**

Professor of English at James Madison University, Joanne V. Gabbin hosted the 1994 Furious Flower Poetry Conference and became executive director of the Furious Flower Poetry Center, the first academic center dedicated to Black poetry. She was inducted into the International Literary Hall of Fame for Writers of African Descent.

An Assistant Professor at Jackson State University, Danielle L. Littlefield writes narratives of Black women in a new, urban South, Her work appears in New Voices, Trouble the Waters: Tales from the Deep Blue, and Illmatic Consequences. She is Fiction Editor at Obsidian: Literature & Arts in the African Diaspora.

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Nearly two years ago, Margaret Walker Center staff hatched an idea to host a special event to mark the 50th anniversary of the iconic 1973 Phillis Wheatley Poetry Festival. In partnership with the Department of English and Modern Languages at Jackson State, this reconvening was planned as a tribute to Wheatley, Walker, and the brilliance of Black women writers.

Identifying and reaching out to the original participants was the first step, and they were our first indication that the reconvening was going to be a popular proposal. Soon after, a wish list of more recent voices was created, and, as those women agreed to join the festival too, we began to solicit wide-ranging partnerships from individuals and organizations across the country.

For this event, we have over 700 registered attendees, close to 90 presenters from around the world, 24 concurrent sessions, and 21 women of color participating in seven keynote events.

We are grateful for the outpouring of support from everyone who contributed their ideas, time, and resources to making the 50th Anniversary Reconvening of the Phillis Wheatley Poetry Festival a remarkable success.




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



