Dr. Mukesh Kumar is an Associate Professor for Urban and Regional Planning at Jackson State University. He also served as the Director of Planning & Development for the City of Jackson, MS. His research interest is focused on the nature and quality of the public realm, and processes — economic and technical, that shape the future of urban areas.

His research has been funded and supported by the National Science Foundation, Federal Highway Administration, Greater New Orleans Chamber of Commerce, and Lincoln Institute of Land Policy. He is currently engaged in two major research projects.
