## Biographical Sketch Chester Robinson, DPA.

Chester Robinson, Associate Professor of Public Policy and Administration, comes to Jackson State University with a wealth of professional and academic experience. In his previous career as a federal civil servant, he was a senior program manager in several health care programs including Medicare, childhood immunizations, hospice care, and long-term care for the elderly. Dr. Robinson's academic education includes a Doctor of Public Administration (DPA) with a focus on health policy, a Master of Policy Science, a Master of Liberal Arts, and a Bachelor of Science in Social Work.

Before coming to JSU, he taught at several universities, including Tennessee State University, the University of Maryland at Baltimore County, and Shaw University. His teaching areas are public administration, health policy, epidemiology, financial management, program implementation and organizational behavior. Dr. Robinson's appointment to the National Advisory Committee on Rural Health and Human Services, extends through April, 2019. The Committee serves as an independent advisory body to the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. The current Committee Chairman, Ronnie Musgrove, is the former Governor of Mississippi. The Committee produces reports on key rural health issues and makes recommendations on possible solutions. The Committee consists of 16 experts representing a geographic and professional mix across the country. The Committee includes individuals knowledgeable in the delivery, financing, research, and administration of rural health services.

Dr. Robinson has published a number of articles in peer reviewed and professional publications. A sampling of his publications are listed below. During his stay at JSU, Dr. Robinson expects to continue his research interests in hospice care and end-of-life decision making, public policy issues, and charitable organizations and giving in the U.S.
