- can provide insights into research funding.

# How does the challenge work for you (for grant writing)?

To identify the people who will be the most help to your research career

- Make a list of those on your campus who have grant-writing experience
- Look for on-campus help with evaluation, especially in the social sciences and education fields
- Go by your office of sponsored programs and talk to the personnel there (they want to hear from you!)

- Consider collaborators in your discipline, especially those you have met at conferences or know from graduate school
- Identify well-known leaders in the field and make contact with them
- Reach out to program officers at agencies that fund work like yours.
   IMPORTANT NOTE: Have a short written summary of your research agenda and an "elevator speech" on your next project ready



# First steps to the challenge

- Practice this approach with low-stakes contacts first
- Develop active listening practices
- Follow up with an informal "thank you" email within a few days
- Always ask the person you connect with for suggestions for other collaborators
